

## **WMCON 2015 REPORT GHANA**

### **Overview**

I think the WMCON 15 was a complete success in my opinion. Every detail of the organisation was on point and actually appealed to my expectations for the conference. It was clear that this conference's focus was to gather community (affiliates) representatives to discuss problems, challenges, and learning points with the aim of addressing these problems learning from other affiliates success and discuss what support could emerge.

The highlight of the entire conference to me is that the WMF is willing to support its affiliates and is undergoing a metamorphosis to meet the spontaneous needs of its entities. This was shown in the priority to collect feedbacks and the changes happening in the foundation (new roles, etc.)

### **Pre-conference (Learning Day)**

The preconference workshop held from the 13th - 14th May, 2015 (Wednesday and Thursday).

The aim of the preconference workshop was to gain a basic shared understanding of program evaluation, learning the common language of evaluation, discuss different sources of data, increase skills in using tools, and share experiences amongst program leaders. This bit of the conference was focused on maximising the potentials or empowering program leaders to do more.

It was an insightful opportunity to learn a few data collection or reporting tools, discussing our fears and hopes for the grant process, creating logic models for our projects, survey design and adequate reporting and storytelling. This session was particularly important to me because of my activities on projects, it was highly useful and encourage project leaders to share detail insights with their communities to ensure successful projects.

### **Conference Days (15th - 17th May, 2015)**

Kindly note that my report may be skewed towards a particular topic due to the variety of sessions that were available and my choices of which sessions i visited.

On the Friday i attended the introduction for newcomers. This session highlighted on all the various entities that work to make the Wikimedia Movement. Their roles and essence to affiliates (chapters, thematic organisations and user groups) were spelt out respectively. We

were encouraged to share our problems in order to get help. One very important issue that was raised was how key volunteers were to our movement and how best we could preserve them for future use.

I then joined the Collective impact and Fund Raising session. It was shared that cooperation with other Wikimedia Affiliates on the continent and other institutions with similar ideals (open source movement, creative commons, etc.) was key to building volunteer base and also sustainability of projects. As most of these volunteers are already involved in volunteerism of a sort and are already conversant with the open source and open knowledge movements. We also spoke about how to manage our finances and raise funds from appropriate partnerships and other related organisations that may benefit from our work. The last session i joined on the day was "Learn about the FDC" where they thoroughly spoke about the work of the FDC. We then moved to the WMDE office at the close of the day to have dinner.

On Saturday i attended the sessions on Volunteer Supporters Network, Reporting & Storytelling, Community Capacity Development Framework, Wiki Loves Photo Contest, Lila's Talk and Reflection on Lila's Talk.

At the volunteers supporters network we delved into matters surrounding volunteer recruitment and retention. We also learnt that reporting was key for future works on similar projects and communities have to build a strong base of committed members to be able to thrive in their activities. Lila's talk showcased the commitment of the WMF to support affiliates and their willingness to implement strategies that will suit the growth of the movement. She indicated that the level of growth of the foundation demands some meticulous restructuring to accommodate the needs of all.

The last stop of the day before dinner at WMDE's office was a reflection on the Lila's Talk and the way to possibly go as a movement.

On the final day of the conference i participated in the Grantmaking impact Focus and Communications Best Practices. I was forced to join the Usergroup Meetup after these sessions because i went on the ticket of my usergroup thereby missing two other very important sessions i wanted to be at (Future of the WMCON and Building Bridges between WMCON & Wikimania).

I suggested at the usergroup meetups that the WMF can also show their commitment to user groups in this direction by allowing at least two representatives to allow for delegation to sessions since it was difficult for me throughout the conference to miss out on some sessions that i deemed equally important to the ones i sometimes chose to attend. This was my greatest worry and complaint at the conference.

Lest i forget, we had the **African Meetup** on the saturday. The focus of the meetup was to discuss what had resulted from the Wiki Indaba Conference and the way forward. in attendance were;
